CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT
JULY 2016**

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

On June 21, the IMF released a survey done on Jamaica's performance and economic developments under the current IMF programme. The survey highlighted the fact that the country has met more than 95% of the programme's conditions, which has resulted in an improved macroeconomic landscape. The survey identified that Jamaica's reforms are beginning to bear fruit, however bold reforms are needed as growth is still too low. In addition to bold reforms, the IMF also emphasized that fiscal discipline is crucial to restoring economic stability, as well as growth-enhancing structural reforms.

The IMF identified the following areas as needing reform:

- Increasing access to finance by increasing banking sector competition and reforming financial sector taxation.
- Downsizing the public sector through improving efficiency and reallocating public functions back to the private sector.
- Cutting bureaucracy at all levels of government to aid the business climate and strengthen productivity and competitiveness.
- Implementing labour market reforms that strengthen the link between pay and performance and increase labour market dynamism.
- Reducing crime and tackling both its economic and broader social ramifications.

For the period June 2016 relative to May 2016, the monthly average of the US dollar and the Canadian dollar depreciated relative to the Jamaican dollar, while the monthly average of the Great Britain Pound appreciated. At the end of June 2016, the value of the Jamaica Dollar depreciated by J\$1.32 or 1.06% to J\$126.01=US\$1.00. The Canadian dollar depreciated by J\$1.62 or 1.68% to end at CAD\$1.00=J\$97.82. The value of the Pound went down by J\$0.84 or 0.5% to end at GBP1.00=J\$179.13.

Inflation, measured by the All Jamaica "All Divisions" Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased by 0.9% for the period June 2016 over May 2016. This was the highest movement since July 2015 when the index moved by a similar 0.9%. The increase in the rate for June brought inflation for the calendar year to date to -0.6%. The increase in the rate for June 2016 over May 2016 brought inflation for the fiscal year to June to 0.7%. The 12-month point to point rate at the end of June 2016 was 2.5%.

Data for the month ending June 2016 revealed that the stock of Net International Reserves (NIR) at the Bank of Jamaica was J\$259.72 billion (US\$2,265.13 million).

The monetary base increased by J\$0.444 billion to J\$120.682 billion for June 2016 relative to May this year.

On the last trading day in June 2016, for the period June 01, 2016 to June 30, 2016, the main JSE index advanced by 3,155.67 points or 2.02% to close at 159,717.44 points. The JSE Combined Index advanced by 3,671.31 points or 2.20% to close at 170,807.02 points. The JSE Junior advanced by 72.40 points or 3.39% to close at 2,208.16 points. In contrast, once again, the JSE Cross Listed Index remained firm and closed the month at 499.06 points.

Stopover tourist arrivals for April 2016 were 188,604. For the January to April period, stopover tourist arrivals were 773,108. A total of 131,898 cruise passengers visited Jamaica in April 2016. The January to April 2016 period saw 745,220 cruise passenger arrivals at the three major ports, an increase of 90,656 passengers or 13.8% compared to the corresponding period last year.

For March 2016, the overall weighted average lending rate on domestic currency loans decreased to 16.67% from 16.81% relative to the previous month. The weighted average domestic interest rates on deposits for the month ending was 1.47%. This represented a decrease of 9bps relative to February.

For March this year, the foreign currency loans rate increased relative to February 2016. In this regard, the rate marginally increased by 3bps to 7.35%. On the other hand, the interest rates on foreign currency deposits decreased for March relative to February this year, falling by 4bps to 1.66%.

At the end of February 2016, gross remittance inflows were US\$180.1 million and net remittances were US\$161.1 million. Total remittance inflows for January and February this year was US\$340.4 million.

There were price reductions observed in 19.05% (4) of the commodities monitored for June 2016. The price of crude oil index Brent increased in June 2016, as well as the WTI. The Brent moved up by 2.86% and the WTI increased by 4.06%. Natural gas increased by 33.85%. The IMF's Fuel Energy index increased by 4%, and the Food and Beverage Index increased by 4%. The all commodity price index increased by 3%.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

STANDING COMMITTEE ON NATIONAL SECURITY

Highlights of the meeting held on Tuesday, July 19:

ACP Assan Thompson delivered a presentation on the issues and challenges being caused by unofficial ports of entry into Jamaica. He reported that from a survey conducted by the Border Security Branch, there are approximately one hundred and forty-five (145) unofficial ports into the country.

ACP Thompson reported on the current and emerging threats to the island including drug trafficking, firearm trafficking, human trafficking, illegal migration, illegal fishing and illegal trade routes. He stated that Jamaica is located in a very volatile area neighbored by Honduras, Colombia, Venezuela and Costa Rica, all countries facing numerous security challenges and their activities have a negative influence on the country.

ACP Thompson further stated that with the use of available resources at its disposal, the Border Security Branch plans to do more to protect the borders of the island. He noted the required resources for this operation such as:

Land

- Trained personnel
- Proper fuelling system
- Proper asset disposal system
- Motor vehicles

Sea

- Boats
- Communication devices
- Divers and diving equipment

- Geo-tracking system

Air

- Drones

JCF Crime Statistics

The crime statistics for the period January 1 – July 16, 2016 were summarised and compared to the same period last year as follows:

- Murders – 656 were recorded: this represents a decrease of -3 or 0%
- Shootings – 588 were recorded: this represents a decrease of -12 or -2%
- Rape – 267 were recorded: this represents a decrease of -106 or -28%
- Aggravated Assault – 252 were recorded: this represents a decrease of -107 or -30%

In terms of Acquisitory Crime

- Robberies – 804 were reported: this represents a decrease -361 or -31%
- Break ins – 712 were reported: this represents a decrease of -382 or -35%
- Larceny – 116 were reported: this represents a decrease of -105 or -48%

Divisions of Concern:

- St. James reported 139 murders: this represents an increase of 17 or 14%
- Clarendon reported 75 murders: this represents an increase of 12 or 19%
- St. Catherine North reported 67 murders: this represents a decrease of -4 or -6%
- Westmoreland reported 54 murders: this represents an increase of 2 or 4%

CRIME STOP

The Crime Stop Coordinator's report highlighted the following for the month of July 2016:

- The number of calls received was 39, 6 more than what was received in June.
- The success ratio was 1 in 5, in comparison to 1 in 3 in June.
- Two arrests were made, while four arrests were made in June.
- The number of calls made to 311 was 33, 2 more than what was received in June.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Highlights of the meeting held on Wednesday, July 20:

Petrojam Fuel Prices

Mr. Chung pointed the committee in the direction of a news story carried by the Gleaner which indicated that Howard Mollison, General Manager of Petrojam, had resigned. Mr. Chung noted that Mr. Mollison was scheduled to deliver a presentation to the committee regarding the operations of PetroJam, but was not able to do so at the proposed time. Mr. Chung stated that at the last meeting with Mr. Mollison, he was advised that PetroTrin had agreed to reduce the premium on the fuel. He noted that though the reduction was good, the aim was to have the premium removed altogether and the issue will be pushed until that is done.

Retrofitting of the PSOJ

Mr. Chung informed the committee that Ms. Tracy Lacroix has been in dialogue with Kwame Hall and David Barrett regarding the PSOJ's retrofitting. Mr. Hall commented that a detailed assessment has already been carried out and that they are in the process of putting together a financing package for the PSOJ.

Renewable Energy

Mr. Scott advised the committee that Jamalco's 100MW plant has been approved by the cabinet, stating that it will consist of a gas pipeline. Mr. Scott went on to say that the JPS was working on providing funding (US\$205M). He further stated that all the funds will be committed and raised in roughly three weeks and once that is done, the first payment of US\$28M will be made and the project will commence (in terms of buildouts).

Mr. Chung enquired as to the next move considering the cancellation of the Climate Change Adaptation Project. Mr. Barrett responded that consideration was being given to beach nourishment as an alternative; he however noted that the funds allocated could not be used to finance this alternative.

AOB

Mr. Scott suggested that an update of the DBJ study on the returns for solar energy be done. Mr. Hall agreed and reasoned that the findings of the study have become outdated due to significant changes in prices and other factors related to the use of solar. Mr. Scott advised that he would speak to the DBJ regarding the updating of the study.

Mr. Barrett advised the committee that in August, another opportunity to benefit from the USAID CARCEP Small Grant Loan would be available. He further advised that the loan supports project development from feasibility to the implementation stage.

Mr. Barrett enquired if there were any updates from the meeting held with the Trinidadian Prime Minister. Mr. Mahfood responded that there was nothing definitive coming out of the meeting. He noted that the issues seemed to have been pushed aside; he however stated that the PSOJ will definitely be pressing the issues especially those related to subsidies and trade.
