POLICE COURTESY WEEK

he Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF), in collaboration with the Private Sector Organisation of Jamaica (PSOJ), launched the first in a series of Police Courtesy Weeks in the parish of St. Elizabeth during the week of Dec. 8-14, 2002.

Superintendant Herman Brown, of the Black River Police Station notes that the Courtesy Week was planned to emphasize police courtesy and the partnership between the police and the public that they serve. He went on to say, "At the end of this week, the objective is that the public must feel that there is a stonger and more positive relationship between the police and the people of St. Elizabeth".

The Week's activities commenced with the official launch at a church service on Sunday, 8th December, at the Waterloo Apostolic Church, Santa PSOJ representative, Mrs. Marlene Parker attended and in her address noted that the PSOJ supports the Jamaica Constabulary Force's new policy of providing training in customer service, ethics and values as these would further enhance the partnerships being developed. On Monday, 9th December, Open Days were held at all eleven St. Elizabeth Police Stations, with the public invited to view the operations and tour these

stations. This was followed by a series of activities, including a visit to the Black River Hospital, a rap session/sporting activity at the Mannings Boys Home, a Public Forum at the Comfort Villa Guest House, at which PSOJ President, Oliver Clarke was the main speaker. At this function, the PSOJ/JCF Law and Order Peace Award was presented to Mr. Donnavan Smith, an outstanding St. Elizabeth citizen who has played an important role in promoting Law and Order in St. Elizabeth.

The Week's activities also included "Work Days" at the Barbary Hall and Round Hill Basic Schools, a visit to the Santa Cruz infirmary by the Cops for Christ Group, the Elton Cawley Area 3 Domino Competition and a Fun Day on Saturday, 14th December. All policemen in the parish wore special pins promoting Police Courtesy Week. Oliver Clarke, PSOJ President, says "It is important that the public see the police as their partner in the ongoing flight against crime and corruption in our society".

Police Courtesy Weeks are expected to be held in each parish during 2003, with the second event to be held in Manchester during the week of January 26 to February 01, 2003.

Association. One of these Committees, chaired by Mrs.
Marie Archer-Hitchins of Fabric Consultants Limited, is
the Education Committee.

The Education Committee was set up to work with the public sector to assist in improving the quality and standard of education that is required for us to operate within the global environment. For 2002, the Committee continued its work on the ground through the Mentorship Programme, which seeks to improve the quality of education by working with Principals on management-related areas of their job. Mentors from the Private Sector were identified for the interested schools. The most successful of these has been Holy Trinity Comprehensive High School mentored by Mrs. Jump-Barnaby of Scotiabank Jamaica Ltd., with the PSOJ Liaison being Mrs. Jem Woolery-Davis.

Principal of the Holy Trinity Comprehensive High School, Mrs. Monica Schroeter, who has worked at this school for the past thirty-five years, noted that the collaborative effort proved to be very successful. "One of the major plans implemented included the formation of The Committee for Change and Development", continued Mrs. Schroeter. "Out of that committee, we were able to draft a vision statement, a mission statement, draw up an action plan and implement some of these activities to improve the general performance of the school. A cultural development programme has been started and three medals were won in last year's National Festival Competition."

Education Committee members also sit on a variety of Ministry of Education & Youth Committees and/or review boards to represent the PSOJ. These Committees deal with issues and/or projects related to Youth Policy, CXC. Early Childhood Education and Youth Development & Training

It is important to note that a very important policy for Jamaican Youth is currently being developed. Education Committee member, Mr. Linton Smith, represented the PSOJ on this Steering Committee for National Adolescent

& Youth Policy. Some of the noteworthy aspects of this policy include the provision of incentives to employers, protection of youths from job discrimination and the attachment of work experience programmes for all secondary and tertiary educational institutions.

To further improve the Education Committee's mandate, a new Terms of Reference is being developed for submission to the Council for 2002. The committee will be focusing on the following priority areas:

- i. Review of the Education Act & Regulations
- ii. Monitoring & Evaluation of the White Paper
- iii. Monitoring & Evaluation of Mentorship Programme
