





## The Carbon challenge



Trinidad and Tobago

1997 BP publicly acknowledges the need for precautionary action to cut GHG emissions after exiting the Global Climate Coalition.

1999 BP initiates the CO, capture project with other companies and governments. studying methods of capturing and storing CO, at power plants.

2001 BP achieves its 2003 Based on 2010 target nine years early, having reduced GHG emissions by energy efficiency projects and cutting flaring of unwanted gas.

work at Princeton. BP sets out a range of technology options to stabilize **GHG** emissions over 50 years, including increases in solar, wind, gasfired power and carbon capture and storage.

2005 BP announces plans for the world's first industrial-scale hydrogen power plant. BP launches **BP Alternative** Energy

1998 BP sets target to 2000 BP begins cut emissions from our operations to 10% below 1990 levels by 2010






