ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE COURT

"Timely Delivery of a High Standard of Justice for All"

The Honourable, Chief Justice Lensley Wolfe has introduced the above mission statement for the court system. The statement indicates that efforts are being made to ensure efficiency in the justice system of the highest standard. The aim is to reduce the backlog of cases therefore making justice more accessible. To meet this target, a number of new courts have been created and the disposal rates of earlier courts are much improved. These Courts include:

THE NIGHT COURT

This Court was started on September 4, 1995 in the parishes of St. James, Corporate Area Criminal, Clarendon and St. Catherine; Night Court was introduced in Traffic Court in November of the same year. In February 1999, the Court was introduced in St. Thomas, St. Ann, Trelawny, Westmoreland and a second court was established in St. James.


Night Court was created to deal with both civil and criminal cases. Civil matters included Monies Owed, Rent Owed, and Recovery of Tenement, Default Judgement, Judgement Summons and Damages. Whilst criminal cases included breaches of the Public Utilities Act, Affiliation, Tourist Related Offences, Assault at common-law, Assault Occasioning Bodily Harm, Ganja and Cocaine related cases, Housebreaking and Larceny, Simple Larceny, Traffic violations and others.

To date, there have been sharp increases in filed cases as more cases are being referred to this Court; disposal rates are also on the increase. Deferrals are below thirty percent (30%) on a monthly basis. Please view Table 1A and Graph 1 to depict the flow of cases since its inception.

THE REGIONAL GUN COURT

The Gun Court Act of 1974 allowed all Gun Court offences to be tried in the Gun Court located in Kingston. The number of offences to be tried increased tremendously creating a heavy backlog in the Gun Court. In an effort to reduce the backlog, the Gun Court Act was amended to provide for trial of Gun Court cases in the Circuit Court's sittings in the rural parishes. However, there was a colossal increase in the Circuit Court cases in the parishes of St. James, Trelawny, Westmoreland and Hanover. The result was that a large number of these cases remained untried for an extended period.

A decision was then taken to establish a Gun Court for these parishes. The intention was to reduce the build-up of cases and have speedier trials. The Gun Court Amendment Act sought to give effect to that decision.

The Regional Gun Court had its inception on the March 26, 1999 and has made an impact on the case flow in the western section of the island. Since then, the Court has surpassed the objective of case disposal time being no longer than eighteen (18) months. Already, the Court has achieved a record disposal time of less than six (6) weeks from the time the case is filed to the time of case disposal.

THE ST. CATHERINE RESIDENT MAGISTRATE COURT- Portmore Division

The St. Catherine Resident Magistrates Court- Portmore Division had its official launch on January 31, 2000. This Court is located at the former police post in Greater Portmore that was converted to a courthouse and began operations on February 1, 2000. The Court has special emphasis on family cases in the parish of St. Catherine.

There are sittings every Tuesday, and on Thursdays a Deputy Clerk of Court is at the courthouse to facilitate the filing of complaints by persons living in Portmore. This establishment is necessary in catering to the needs of a rapidly expanding community. The result will culminate in a quick movement of family cases and a higher disposal rate in the court system of St. Catherine.

THE DRUG COURT

The Minister of National Security and Justice had appointed July 17, 2000 as the date for the Drug Court to become operational. Legislation has created a Drug Court, which will help in the control of substance abuse among juvenile and non-violent substance abuse offenders. The Chief Justice and a committee set up to implement the programme are putting in place the relevant infrastructure for the targeted date.

The preparation for the Court includes attendance to the International Association of Drug Court Professional (IADCP) which was held May-30- June 3, 2000. Two representatives were sent as participants. The participants are Her Honour, Miss Paulette Williams, a Resident Magistrate to Westmoreland and Mrs. Clover Thompson-Gordon, the President of the Lay Magistrate's Association and she is also the Principal of Denham Town Comprehensive High School.

There are continuous meetings with the Chief Justice, a selected committee and the treatment providers (represented by the National Council on Drug Abuse) to improve and to create additional facilities for treatment. Already, Custodes have made recommendations for the Justices of the Peace to work in the Drug Court. Two Justices of the Peace are required per sitting.

THE SMALL CLAIMS COURT

Since the legislated date of the Small Claims Court, December 17, 1999, the Chief Justice has been making preparation for the effective operation of the Court. The Court is targeted to deal with claims not exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50, 000) for parties not being represented by Counsel. The Chief Justice is in discussions with the Dispute Resolution Foundation and the Law School in order to work out the details of the referral process.

The Court is projected to work simultaneously with the Dispute Resolution Foundation. The procedure is that whenever the judge is of the opinion that mediation may be of assistance, the judge may refer the parties to a mediator approved by the Dispute Resolution Foundation.

INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF JUDGES

The accessibility to justice is important; however, the quality of justice is given as much consideration within this court year. In due consideration, the Cabinet has given approval for an increase in the number of posts of the judges in the Supreme Court. This legislation has moved the number of Supreme Court judges from twenty (20) to twenty-four (24) judges. This move will not only ease the case flow but also allow more timely and efficient judgement. However, the additional judges have not been placed as the Ministry of National Security and Justice awaits the permission for financing from the Ministry of Finance.

THE COURT REPORTING SCHOOL

This is a new initiative that began operations on January 3, 2000 in an effort to introduce Real Time Court Reporting to our court system. This type of Court Reporting takes verbatim notes using software to translate the shorthand notes into English and immediately generates a document for the judge and a copy on the computer for further editing. It should be noted that the first batch of graduates from the eighteen- (18) months course will be finished by June 2001 and will be deployed to their respective courts by August 2001. The projection for the school is that it will provide the staffing of reporters for the court system. There will be a pilot project to test the effectiveness of the Real Time Reporting in the Resident Magistrate's Court. The overall benefit will be a faster draft of the transcripts for the perusal of the judges and quickens the pace of the issuing of justice. This will expedite trials in the court system.

The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) has been a sponsor of this venture. CIDA has provided funding for the training and the provision of amenities such as software and equipment. The agency has also given assistance to train technicians for the maintenance of the equipment. To date, six persons have been identified for training as technicians; these include two (2) Jamaica Defence Force soldiers, two teachers from the Court Reporting School and two persons from the Supreme Court.

INTRODUCTION

The Court Statistics Report for 1999/2000 gives a presentation of the case management for the year in the Court of Jamaica. The report aims at producing information on the structure and statistics of each Court. It should be noted that the Court Statistics is ordinal data and is therefore a simple count of cases filed, pending and disposed of. This compilation is of significance as it caters for:

<u>Administration</u>: - As an organization, the Court should be able to monitor its activities, productivity and efficiency. Proper management demands this information in order to determine whether the objectives and goals are being met; hence the Minister of National Security and Justice and the Chief Justice will find the data useful to discern performance levels and effectiveness thus making projections for the future.

<u>Planning</u>: - The information is relevant to government, non-government and private entities that are decision-makers in planning issues. (These issues may encompass social, education, and economic issues.) The statistics gives added insight to the role of the Court in our society.

<u>Policy Research and Analysis:</u> - The statistics assists to display the effects of changes in law and policy and also helps to discern the impact of these changes on a branch of the Criminal Justice System (the Court).

There are areas to be improved upon and this can be achieved with the infusion of technology and personnel within the section. Despite the odds, the Court Statistics Unit has presented the Statistics for the Court year and hopes the information will be deemed valuable.

METHODOLOGY

A number of strategies have been used to collect the data for the Court. These strategies are varied for the different levels of the Court system and according to the idiosyncrasies of each Court. The data is collected manually with the exception being the Court of Appeal.

The Resident Magistrate's Court operates on a quarterly basis and the Business Done Returns are produced from the parishes for each quarter. The Court Statistic Unit collects the Business Done Returns and then compiles and generates the statistics for the Resident Magistrate's Court.

The Night Court data is submitted by the participating parishes for the Night Court Bulletin that is prepared by the Court Statistics Unit on a monthly basis. The statistics is presented in this report by the breakdown of case filings and disposals for each parish. The statistics also presents the breakdown of the type of offences filed and disposed in the Night Court.

The Supreme Court's data is collected in terms – Michaelmas, Hilary and Easter. The Supreme Civil data is collated at the Supreme Civil Registry. An electronic filing system has been designed to process civil cases. However the system can only monitor case filings and need to be developed to monitor disposals. The disposed cases are still being tallied manually. The Supreme Criminal's data is derived from the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions. This data is also collected by the named terms. The Gun Court's data is collected on a monthly basis.

The Court of Appeal has a more technological method for collection. A database has been created to process the cases and therefore cases can be tracked from the initial filing to disposal. The system is designed for close monitoring.

The Manpower data is obtained via the Personnel Department of the Ministry of the National Security and Justice.

THE JUSTICE TRAINING INSTITUTE

Quality has been an emphasis as the Justice Training Institute continues to co-ordinate training programmes for persons within the court system. The Institute has been established for three (3) years and has trained over two thousand (2,000) persons within the Criminal Justice System.

The major training programmes include:

- ❖ A Certificate in Legal Administration
- The Criminal Justice Studies Programme
- Deputy Clerks Qualifying Course
- Justice of the Peace Training

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The Courts have embarked on a major technological development process in the justice system as the Supreme Court has become computerized. Approximately thirty-five computers were given to the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeal by the Ministry of National Security and Justice, allowing judges to have access to personal computers, in their chambers, that is connected to the internet; each judge also has an e-mail address.

A web site (sc.gov.jm) has been established with the help of Mr. Peter Wright — Consultant to the Supreme Court. The web site displays scheduled cases for the Supreme Court. Mr. Wright has also designed an electronic telemanagement system that has simplified the filing system and allows the legal fraternity and the public to file and access data electronically in the Supreme Court. The immediate benefit is the swift and easy filing of cases and the quick search and retrieval of data by the Court.

THE BAIL ACT

An Act entitled "An Act to Make provisions Respecting Bail and for Connected Matters" was passed on July 14, 2000. The objective of the Act is to ensure that accused persons are not denied bail unless the denial is in the interest of justice, in the interest of the community and promotes consistency in the approach taken by bail decision-makers in this regard. These provisions refer to the grant or denial of bail in criminal proceedings.

MATTERS UNDER CONSIDERATION

There are a number of issues that are being reviewed for the new Court year (September 2000- June 2001). Below is a listing of both projects and legislation affecting the Court. These include:
